North: I-40

South: Dandridge and Brooks Avenues

East: Chilhowee Drive

West: Hall of Fame Drive

This guide's goal is to inform community members and organizations about all the resources and services in East Knoxville. The guide's second goal is to make it easier for community members to use the resources and services in their area.

<u>Five Points Up</u> is a community-led organization consisting of individuals and leaders from East Knoxville. Our mission is to reduce health inequities in the Five Points neighborhood by beautifying and unifying East Knoxville.

Health inequities are unfair, avoidable and unjust health outcomes. An example of a health inequity is that black Knox County residents are more likely to have high blood pressure than white Knox County residents, according to the Knox County Health Department's 2014 Community Health Assessment. There is no real reason why more black residents should have higher blood pressure rates as compared to white residents. This is a health inequity in our community.

Five Points Up works towards its mission through community—building events and projects. These events and projects include the East Knoxville Communitywide Clean-Up, Five Points Winter Wonderland and the Five Points Community Resource Guide.

Our current focus is increasing access to healthy foods (food access) in East Knoxville. Learn more about food access on page 4.

food access

In May 2016, Five Points Up decided that their first health focus would be <u>increasing access to healthy foods in East Knoxville</u> and the Five Points neighborhood.

East Knoxville is categorized as a food desert by the United States Department of Agriculture. A food desert is an area that does not have access to fresh fruits, vegetables and other healthy foods.

But East Knoxville is home to several creative organizations working to increase access to healthy foods in all East Knoxville neighborhoods, including Five Points. Five Points Up's goal is to highlight these organizations in this guide. This is a first step in supporting food access in East Knoxville.


PROGRAMS/SERVICES CATEGORIES:

- **Education:** All types of educational services, such as formal education and tutoring programs.
- **Ex-Offender Programs**: Resources for individuals who have been in prison or jail.
- Food Access: Resources for fresh and healthy foods, including fruits and vegetables. This is Five Points Up's current priority. See page 4 for more information.
- Historical Organizations: Provide historical education and resources.
- Housing: Provide resources for individuals and families to obtain and keep their housing.
- **Media:** Share the community's stories and provide information.
- Medical/Health Care: Provide medical and health care.
- Meeting/Event Space: Provide meeting & event space for community members and other organizations.
- Recreation: Provide recreation and play opportunities for adults and youth.
- Senior Services: Provide resources and services for senior residents.
- **Transit:** Provide transportation services for residents.
- Workforce Development: Provide services (like trainings and educational opportunities) for community members seeking employment.
- Veterans Services: Provide services for veterans.
- Volunteer Opportunities: Organizations that accept and seek volunteers.
- Youth Programs: Programming specifically for young people. Includes after-school programs and summer camps.

Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) makes meaningful mentorship matches between volunteers (Bigs) and children ages 6-18 (Littles). They then provide the training, resources and support necessary for those matches to succeed in their programs.



Programs include:

Site-based: Bigs meet with their Littles at school.

- Community-based: This is the traditional match in which adult mentors are paired with children ages 6-16 with the commitment to see each other 2-4 times per month for a couple hours.
- Mentor 2.0: This program focuses on college readiness and success for high school students, particularly those who will be firstgeneration college students. Communication happens through weekly writing activities via email. Mentors and mentees also meet in-person 8 times per year at BBBS-sponsored activities.
- Bigs in Blue: Bigs In Blue is a one-to-one mentoring program that connects youth with police to build strong, trusting, lasting relationships. These relationships help build stronger bonds between law enforcement and the families they serve.





Planting Seeds of Hope Community Garden is home to a variety of seasonal vegetables, fruit trees and herbs.

Staff use food from the garden to teach families how to cook nutritious meals for \$1.50 per serving or less. Families are also able to take excess meals home for future meals or to feed family members. Youth partner with Abbey Fields Farm to maintain the garden and harvest crops. The garden is open to the clients and their families and community neighbors.
